

Baybrook Violence Reduction Plan (BVRP)

24-month Implementation Report October, 2022 - October, 2024

The Baybrook Violence Reduction Plan (BVRP) is a community-led public safety strategy to reduce violence and increase the quality of life in the Brooklyn, Brooklyn Park, and Curtis Bay neighborhoods. The BVRP consists of three primary components: (1) Youth Violence Prevention; (2) Youth Engagement; and (3) Community Projects/Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design.

The following is a report on the progress of the BVRP after 24 months of implementation. The report highlights 8 key performance measures. A more detailed breakdown of our quarterly performance reports with 35 distinct performance measures are included in the appendix of this report.






Violence Reduction Team October 2022 - October 2024




Life Plan Development

CLB Average Percent of Life Plan Milestones Achieved






Next Steps

The Life Coach will continue to work with current program participants and to recruit a new cohort of youth to the program.






Small Grants, Big Impact

In-School Programming


GBA subcontracted with two neighborhood-based service providers to provide in-school programming to 62 at risk elementary and middle-schoolers during the first half of 2024. 80 percent of these youth reported improvements in their mental health and school attendance.

311 AMBASSADOR PROGRGRAM

Engages resident volunteers to utilize and promote the City's 311 system in and around high-risk areas.

30 residents, business owners, youth service providers, public sector partners were trained to conduct assessments and implement CPTED interventions in high-risk areas.




BUSINESS SAFETY COMMITTEE

Leadership Development

At the end of 2023, GBA conducted a community organizing training for BVRP Leadership Team Members. Since the training, Team members have conducted more than 67 one-on-one and 46 group meetings with residents and stakeholders in order to engage them in the work.




Leadership Development

In the Spring of 2024, GBA provided 'SafeGrowth' training to 30 residents and neighborhood stakeholders. This was a hands-on training where participants worked in groups to conduct place-based crime assessments and develop recommendations for strategies and interventions.

Violence Reduction Priority Areas

By nature, firearm violence tends to cluster within small areas and among very small groups of people in communities. During BVRP planning, GBA worked with our research partners at the University of Maryland at College Park to identify these small cluster areas. GBA is currently directing its capital CPTED investments into three of these cluster areas.




\$1.3 million of investment

GBA has raised over \$1.3 million dollars to be invested in capital projects that are aimed at reducing crime, such as vacant property improvements and renovations, vacant lot improvements, and beautification projects.

Business Safety Strategy

Since the majority of priority areas are located along Baybrook's commercial corridors, GBA launched a new and innovative Business Safety Committee in May 2023. Members of the Committee and the Baltimore Police Department are utilizing a Good Neighbor Agreement to improve quality of life and reduce crime in our commercial corridors.












